#### 4th - 5th Grades:

• By May 2023, 80% of fourth and fifth-grade students will score at benchmark on the DAZE DIBELS assessment (24).

#### K-5th Students With Disabilities Subgroup:

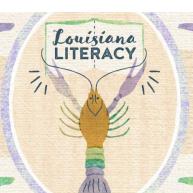

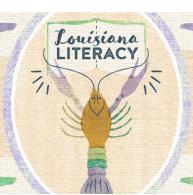
